SECTION A. INFORMATION MADE AVAILABLE TO STAKEHOLDERS

A.1. Preliminary agenda for the meeting

Three different physical stakeholder meetings were held for Turkana County to increase participation levels considering the vast distances between the villages. The meetings will cover separate VPAs to be implemented in the county. Local Stakeholders meetings included the target communities, government authorities and other actors such as indigenous communities and other vulnerable minorities such as pastoralists, agro-pastoralists in which their opinion was sought on the project's design and social and environmental impacts. The project developer believes the key step in successfully implementing the project is ensuring the local community has ownership. project activities will aim not only for direct service delivery but also for technical assistance, and community ownership and sustainability will be elements in the project design.

A.2. A non-technical summary of the project

The following Non-Technical Summary of the Project was provided to the Stakeholders.

Introduction

In 2020, 2 billion people, corresponding to 26% of the global population, needed more safely managed drinking water. With a population of 53 million in Kenya, about 28 million people lack access to safe water. Most households in Turkana County travel long distances to collect water, usually from an unsafe natural source. Most of the time, this responsibility falls on women and girls in these households. The fact that collected water has to be transported long distances to households to be stored pollutes the collected water already; and again, to obtain safe drinking water, the burden of boiling water weighs more on women in the household using inefficient cooking techniques such as

three-stone fires exposing them to harmful air pollutants and affecting the health of women and their babies adversely during pregnancy and after birth.

Purpose of Project

The main objective of the "Safe Water Supply in Turkana County" is to rehabilitate broken, non-functioning boreholes, install new solar-powered pumps, solarise boreholes, and conduct ongoing maintenance and repair for the project's lifetime to eliminate the need for long-distance travel to collect water from unsafe natural sources.

Turkana County is located in the north-western region of Kenya; due to its climatic and geographical characteristics, it is an arid region and semi-arid land with an average rainfall of 200 to 250mm a year and high temperatures approaching 40 degrees Celsius and very much prone to droughts and famines. Turkana faces both physical and economic water scarcity interchangeably during and between seasons. The County shares its international borders with Ethiopia, Sudan and Uganda to the North and West of the county. With the recent unrest in Sudan, Turkana County is being affected harshly by the influx of refugees, especially in basic services such as water supply. Moreover, with the Climate Crisis, the shortage of rainfall has negatively impacted livestock productivity due to exacerbated dry conditions across the region and causing widespread livestock deaths.

In light of the detailed technical feasibility studies carried out by Griot Ltd. UK, an investment in rehabilitation, installation and solarisation of the boreholes in Turkana County has been decided to supply safe water to communities and reduce the boiling need to obtain safe water in the region.

Within the project's scope, 100 hand pumps and 12 solar pumps will be rehabilitated, and 12 hand pumps will be solarised in Turkana County. The project activities will increase access to safe drinking water and reduce the need for boiling unsafe water; hence the extensive usage of non-renewable biomass and the emissions associated with biomass burning will be reduced. Water collection time will also be reduced, enabling women and girls to engage more in education-related or other income-generation activities. The project activities will target mainly rural communities and households, and to some extent, peri-urban communities and the project activities are expected to affect 719,000 beneficiaries in Turkana County. The following activities will be implemented as part of the project activities.

Rehabilitation of the Existing Boreholes

The Project activities will identify and assess the extent of damage and what repairs are required for broken boreholes used as the primary source of drinking water in rural communities that had previously had to travel far to collect water. Comprehensive remediation of the assessed boreholes will be conducted, including flushing all sediments from the boreholes, replacing and/or repairing all broken and worn-out parts, re-assembling the pump, and reinstalling the borehole components and ensuring the borehole is pumping water optimally. The borehole components will be disinfected through chlorination to ensure a clean water supply. Extensive WASH training will be conducted in the community to ensure consistent practices of safe water collection from the borehole, hygienic handling, and secure storage at home. Water quality monitoring will be conducted to ascertain any contamination in the borehole after the rehabilitation. Quarterly monitoring visits will be undertaken to all boreholes to check on functionality, monitor water yield and use, and perform necessary repairs or sensitisation.

Solarisation of the Boreholes

Solar technology will be installed in water wells to provide renewable power to boreholes. The solar photovoltaic panels convert the sun's energy into electricity. The electricity powers a submersible pump, which pumps water from a borehole to a storage tank. The water is then gravity-fed through pipes to water points. Solar energy reduces the costs of extracting water. Solarisation of the boreholes will include three essential pieces of equipment: pumps, control units and solar modules.

Contribution to Sustainable Development While the communities in the Project Boundary boil water to make it safer, providing a safe water supply source will help eliminate the need for boiling water. In the Project's boundary, three-stone fires and inefficient stoves are used for boiling unsafe water, fueled primarily by non-renewable wood fuel in rural areas, thus increasing deforestation rates. With this Project's Activities, the need for boiling unsafe water, hence the extensive usage of non-renewable biomass, and the emissions associated with biomass burning will be reduced. Thanks to the project:

- Costs for buying fuel materials to boil water will be reduced.
- Access to basic services (safe water supply) will be increased.
- Reduced smoke emissions from boiling water will decrease household air pollution and improve well-being, especially for women and children.

- The awareness towards safely managed water will be increased through periodical WASH training.
- Water collection time will be reduced, benefiting, especially women and girls and enabling them more time for other income-generation activities or to engage in educational activities.
- Disease occurrences due to unsafe water consumption will be prevented.
- The project activities will help create new pathways for local economic empowerment for communities. The project activities will enable local communities to earn income from participating in the WASH training activities and build capacity and know-how.
- With the Project Activity, deforestation rates will be reduced biodiversity will be restored.



A.4. Summary of economic, social and environmental impacts of the Project

The contributions of the project activities to the relevant SDGs are given in the table below. Each VPA will at least contribute to the three SDGs explained below.

	<p>The project activities will reduce the costs of buying fuel materials for boiling water and increase access to basic services (safe water supply).</p>

	<p>The project activities will reduce smoke emissions from boiling water, decrease household air pollution and improve well-being, especially for women and children. The number of beneficiaries having access to safe water and the amount of safe water provided will be monitored in the scope of the project activities.</p>
	<p>The project activities will provide periodic WASH training to the communities to enable long-lasting benefits to the community and sustainable implementation.</p>
	<p>The project activities will reduce the time spent collecting wood fuel, water, and boiling water. Women and girls can spend more than 8 hours weekly on fuel and water collection. Water collection can take time away from their education and decreases the chances of income generation by other means. Women, particularly, are exposed to the pollutants released by boiling water with inefficient stoves fueled by biomass fuels (i.e., wood, charcoal). Women and children account for over 60% of all premature deaths from household air pollution.</p>
	<p>Water quality tests conducted in the scope of project activities will monitor water pollutants, and project surveys will investigate water borne disease occurrences.</p>
	<p>Rehabilitation/installation of boreholes will help create new pathways for local economic empowerment. Locals can earn income from participating the training activities related to WASH activities while building capacity and know-how among the communities.</p>

	<p>Using three-stone fires and inefficient stoves for boiling water to obtain safe water emits black carbon and other air pollutants and contributes to climate change, sea ice melt, and deforestation. Thanks to the project activities, the reduction in fuelwood requirements will reduce GHG emissions and air pollutants.</p>
	<p>The project activities will eliminate the need for boiling water to obtain safe water and hence reduce or remove the pressure on local forests for wood collection, and the project activities will increase biodiversity.</p>

Moreover, the project activities will comply with all safeguards, and the real case VPA will monitor the following Gold Standard’s safeguarding principles throughout its lifetime:

Principle 3. Community Health, Safety and Working Conditions:

Incidences of waterborne illnesses will be monitored through the Annual Monitoring Project Survey. The project activities will carry out a WASH programme, including WASH training at the beginning of the project and subsequent WASH follow-up training.

Principle 6.2 Negative Economic Consequences:

To ensure the long-term sustainability of the water points and avoid unexpected breakdowns and spending, training will be conducted at the project’s beginning on performing minor maintenance.

A.5. Other relevant information to help stakeholders understand the project

A presentation was prepared for the stakeholders attending the meeting. The presentation's content included the introduction of the Project Developer, elaborating on Climate Change and Kenya’s water problem, and clarifying the Project’s Objective, location, technology, implementation plan and maintenance & repair procedure. Further, the presentation mentioned safeguarding principles for establishing project activities. The presentation discussed that project activities would undertake an upfront assessment against the Safeguarding Principles & Requirements. Also, SDG contributions of the project activities were mentioned, and monitoring, quantification and reporting of these contributions were communicated to stakeholders.

At the physical meeting, the mechanism for continuous input and grievance was also discussed with the stakeholders to decide the best methods to raise concerns about the project activities. Potential options for filing a grievance and the associated procedures and protocols were elaborated. Moreover, a question-and-answer session was held to allow the stakeholders to ask questions about the project. More detailed minutes of the meetings were given under Section C.2.

Turkana's climate is arid/ semi-arid and drought-prone. The unfriendly climate has always posed a significant challenge to the development of this area and supports mainly pastoralism (cattle, with some camels, sheep, and goats) supplemented by fishing and marginal crop production. The dry environment has turned life into a struggle for survival for the ethnic groups in this region. Resources are scarce, and conflicts over the scarce resources are frequent, usually in the form of violent cross-border cattle raids from Uganda, Sudan, and Ethiopia as pastoralist groups vie for pasture, water, and livestock. Food shortage and insecurity have made life in Turkana extremely difficult.

The failure of four consecutive rainy seasons resulted in prolonged droughts in Turkana County. The region has been hit by droughts recently, leading to crop failure and a lack of water and food. The condition of vulnerable pastoralists and agro-pastoralists in the drought-affected areas of Turkana County is still extremely dire, and the urgency to further scale up the essential services is high. On the other hand, after droughts, the region received hefty rains that resulted in flooding and caused loss of lives, displacement of populations, and destruction of agricultural land, farm harvests, shelter, roads, bridges, water sources and other public infrastructure.

B.1.1. Appropriateness of methods

All required categories of stakeholders specified in the Stakeholder Consultation and Engagement Requirements document, including local policymakers, representatives of local authorities, community leaders, NGOs, and governmental organisations, were invited to the meeting considering 30 days' notice period. For the stakeholders who

have access to the Internet, email invitations were prioritised and sent together with a non-technical summary of the project and meeting agenda, and for those who do not have access to the Internet, personal, door-to-door invitations and phone calls were prioritised, and announcements were hung at public places in the local language. A wide range of stakeholders were invited to ensure broad representation and proper consideration of different points of view. Since Turkana County is the second largest county in Kenya and the transportation means are not well developed for this vast land, three different physical stakeholder meetings were conducted at three different locations to ensure that as many stakeholders as possible can participate. The meetings were conducted with the presence of translators to ensure all questions and responses were understood by all participants and Project Developers.

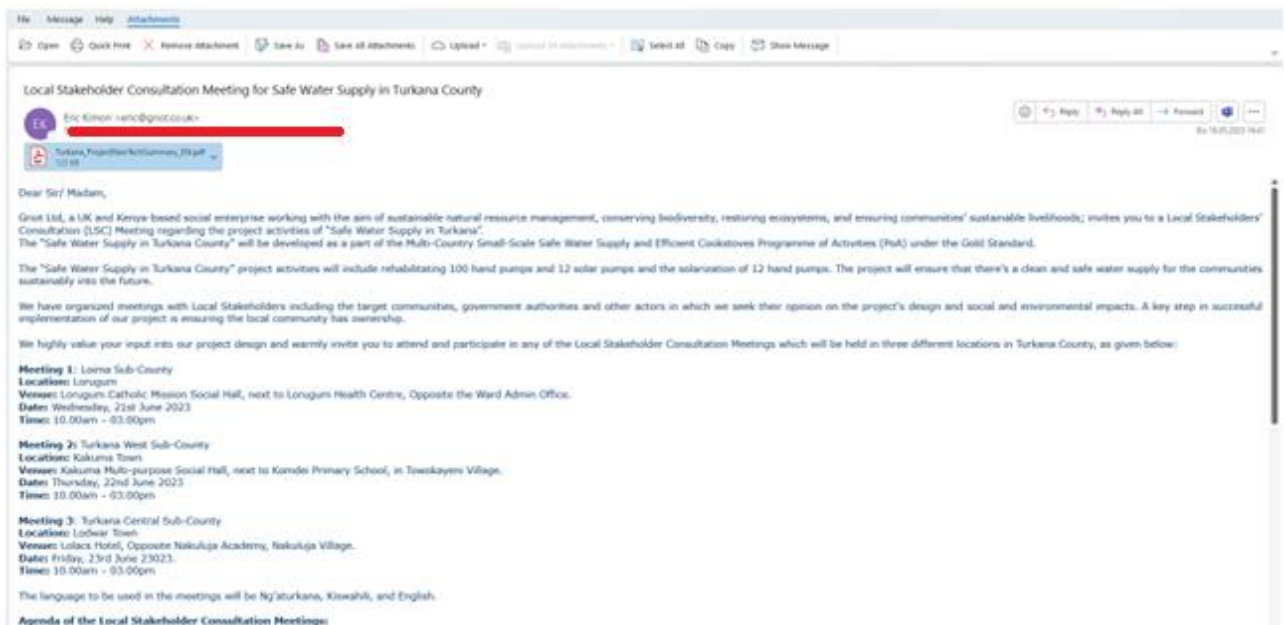
B.1.2. Gender Sensitivity

Water is women's problem; women who are responsible for fetching water and providing safe water directly impact them. Water stress in Turkana County is intensifying with the prolonged droughts due to climate change, taking a toll on women's and girls' time, health, and lives. Unaffordable, inaccessible water has specific implications for women's health due to the increased need for water and hygiene during menstruation, pregnancy, and postpartum recovery. Also, the time spent collecting water decreases girls' probability of completing their education and subject them to sexual abuse and harassment. Despite being responsible for household water needs, women are often under-represented in water governance, including water user committees. Without safely managed water, women and girls are more vulnerable to abuse, attack and ill health, affecting their ability to study, work and live in dignity. The Project Developer recognises women as key stakeholders in water management and aims to translate this into best practices on the ground and improve women's role in water governance. For the stakeholder meetings conducted, the Project Developer ensured that women and girls played a central role in designing and implementing proposed project activities. The Project Developer sees the future implementation of the projects through a gender lens where he wants his actions to respond to the needs of women and girls by involving them in the planning, decision-making and governance of the proposed project activities. For these reasons, women's groups were extensively invited to the meetings, and the participation of their representatives was ensured. Most importantly, the Project Developer collaborates closely with local NGOs with a long track of working on Gender Equality, an NGO focusing on Girls' Education and Rights and Women's Empowerment. These local NGOs have helped the Project Developer ensure

full participatory community processes where women, girls and youth led the stakeholder meetings' discussions. The NGOs put forward a great effort to involve women in the discussions, address their comments and concerns, if any, and communicate envisaged sustainable communication throughout the upcoming project's lifetime to women.

Moreover, in the non-technical project summary, and presentation conducted during meetings, project contribution to Gender Equality was always emphasised.

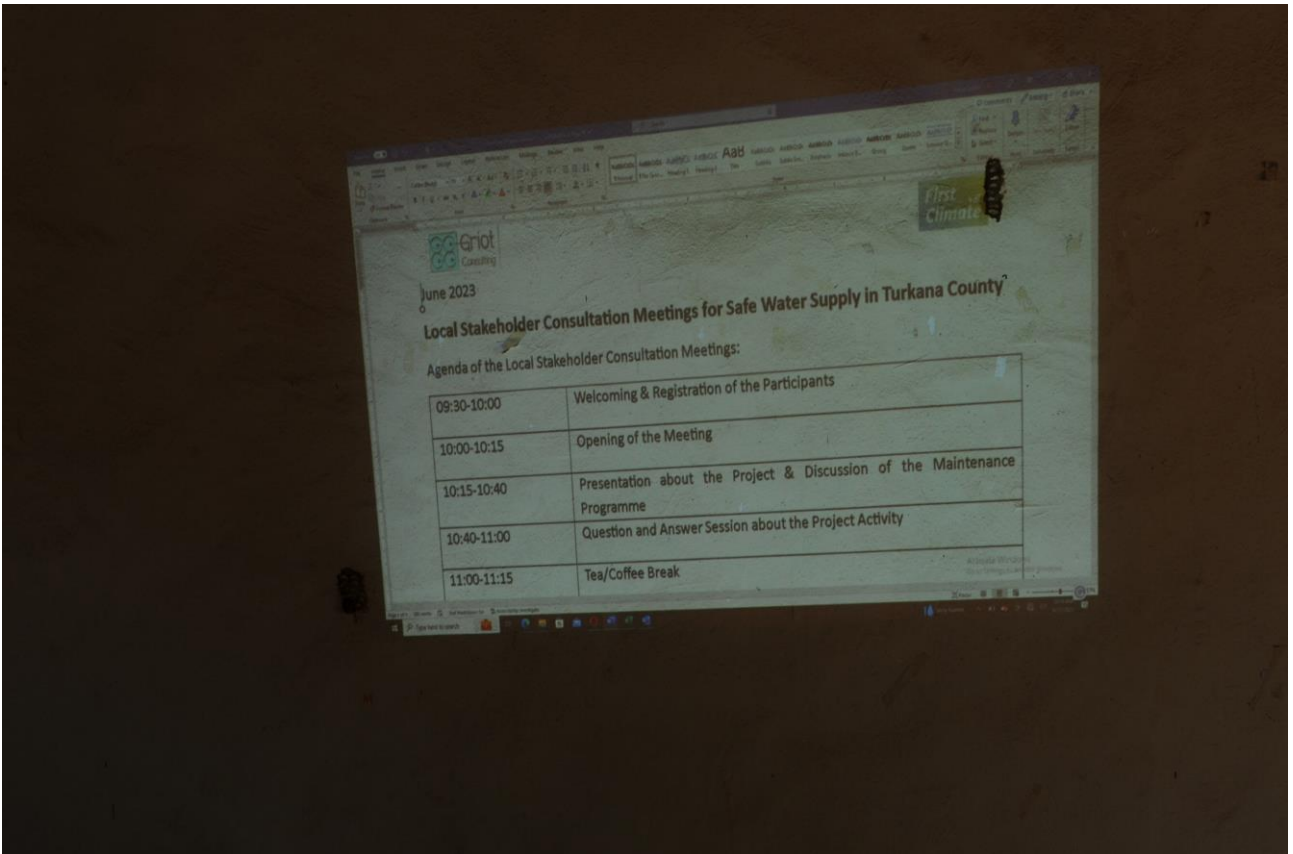

Opening Remarks

Before starting the meeting, the County Chief Officer gave an opening speech stating the objective of the meeting and introducing the Project Developer, local NGO partners of the Project Developer and the Project Consultant. He led participants through the introduction process, each person introducing herself/himself and the area they had come from to get to know the participants better and invited them to a short prayer session led by one of the Village Elders. A local NGO partner, with its 4 members, helped the Project Developer translate the local language and officially opened the meeting by introducing its agenda. All presentations and discussions were translated into the local language and vice versa by the members of this local NGO partner.

Presentation and Q&A sessions by Project's Carbon Consultant

The Project Consultant presented the Project in two parts. The first part focused on introducing the layout and design of the Project. The second part focused on explaining the project's potential environmental, social and economic impacts.

During the first session of the meeting, the Project Carbon Consultant took members through the topics of the Project Purpose, Climate Change and Water Crisis in Turkana, Carbon Certification under Gold Standard, Technology and Implementation Plan, and Maintenance & Repair Procedure of the proposed project activities. The Consultant held a small Q&A session regarding the project technology, implementation plan and maintenance & repair procedure. Stakeholders raised questions regarding mainly the locations of rehabilitation activities. During this Q&A session, it became clear that the people are in dire need of a safe water supply. Stakeholders stated that they have to walk long distances to fetch water, resettle due to water availability or obtain water from streams when it rains or from shallow wells where the water is oftentimes saline. The stakeholders mentioned that it did not rain for four consecutive seasons in Turkana, and last year, in 2022, there was a drought and famine, and thousands of people and livestock died. They continued with the fact that there was no water in schools, and the children had to leave. Another important problem that became clear during this session was that although there have been investments in drilling boreholes, most of them were not maintained well, and even after months, they became non-functional, especially after a heavy rainy season; some pumps would wash off. The County Commissioners did not have the resources to maintain the boreholes, and the equipment was expensive. The stakeholders wanted a sustainable solution. The doctor of the Community Health Facility was present in the meeting, and he stated that they had been facing waterborne diseases quite often. Even the Health Facility does not have a good quality water supply, and they had to sterilise the medical equipment with saline water for surgeries. The doctor reiterated that this Health Facility is in dire need of a safe water supply. A 45-year-old participant said that till his age, he has yet to see the water issue in Turkana ever solved, and currently, as far as he knows, 30 boreholes are nonfunctional in the vicinity of the village where the meeting was being held. He further argued that the previous donors should have consulted with the community and asked about their opinions. Stakeholders also highlighted the importance of involving County Officials and Governmental Agencies in these discussions. After answering the questions raised, a coffee break was given.

Safeguarding Principles & Sustainable Development Discussions

The second session began with introducing the project's contributions to Sustainable Development and Safeguarding principles and requirements the project activities will comply with during the project's lifetime. Then it is requested that the participants form nine different focus groups that represent each Safeguarding Principle as Human Rights, Gender Equality and Women's Rights, Community Health, Safety and Working Conditions, Cultural Heritage, Indigenous Peoples, Displacement and Resettlement, Corruption, Economic Impacts, Climate and Energy, Water, Environment, Ecology and Land Use. Each focus group was requested to assess the Project's possible positive and negative impacts on these Safeguarding Principles and the Project's possible contributions to the 17 SDGs and present the findings of these focus groups to all participants at the end, one by one. After 20 minutes of preparation, each group prepared its presentation and presented the outcomes of focus group discussions to the whole audience. And after each group's presentation, short Q&A sessions were held to gather other opinions and feedback on the specific assessments of each group.

Discussions of Establishing a Continuous Grievance Mechanism

After the focus group discussions, the Project Developer discussed the best mechanism for continuous input and grievances with the stakeholders throughout the project's lifetime. It was agreed that two different mechanisms would be implemented: establishing a Project Implementation Committee (PIC) and a Compliance Response Mechanism (CRM). Project Implementation Committee was selected during the meeting from the local stakeholders everyone knows, ensuring the governance of the water point would be under the responsibility of women. Five persons consisting of 3 women were selected for the Committee, and equal representation of women was prioritised for all meetings. It was decided that whenever there is an issue regarding the water point, the locals will reach out to one of the members of PIC and forward their requests to the local representative of the Project Developer. A Compliance Response Mechanism was decided to be established via three main options: a free local call number, a free local SMS number and an email address of the local representative of the Project Developer were shared for complaints regarding the water point project. The County Chief Officer, present at the meeting, encouraged these two committees to work together and let them know if any support from their side is needed. The County Chief Officer ensured that they were willing to support the water point projects to help the community and work with them to maintain the functionality of these points. The stakeholders were also informed about the grievance book that has been left to the office of the County

Chief Officer to record their feedback and complaints about the project activities. Furthermore, the contact details of the Project Developer were shared with the participants. The evaluation forms were then distributed to the participants to be filled out. The stakeholders were also informed that all project documents would be accessible on the web, and another feedback round would run for two months for the certification. It is also stated that all participants in the meeting would be informed about the start of the second feedback round.

Closing Remarks

The meeting ended at 4 pm with remarks from the Lorugum County Chief Officer, who urged the community members to embrace the Project and be assured of his Office's support whenever required. The Project Developer made it clear in his final remark that the community has ownership of the proposed project activities, and the focus of the project activities is on women's empowerment and people affected by the water crisis. The County Chief Officer thanked the Project Developer for helping the local community access safe water. The Project Developer thanked the participants for their attendance and closed the meeting with a small prayer.

Opening Remarks

A short prayer session led by one of the village elders was held before the opening of the meeting. Project Developer`s local NGO partners led participants through the introduction process, each person introducing herself/himself and the area they had come from. Among the critical stakeholders, the Water Users Committee (Project Implementation Committee) consisting of three females and four males) was all present in the meeting. Also, the ACME Development Organisation, a local NGO representative, attended the meeting, which is quite relevant for the project activities. Another critical local NGO that participated in the meeting was ATUDIS, an organisation conducting WASH programs for the community.

Presentation by Project Consultant

After mentioning the meeting agenda, the same procedures were applied as discussed above for the meeting held in Lorugum. The presentation about Climate Change, Gold Standard, Projects Technology, Implementation Plan, Maintenance & Repair Procedures was held, and the Safeguarding Principles and Sustainable Development concepts were discussed.

Discussions

Again, during this meeting, the stakeholders were of the view that the biggest challenge is the maintenance of this water project point, and they emphasised that collaboration with the County Chief Officers is paramount for the sustainability of boreholes. A representative of the County Chief Officer was present in the meeting, and he also assured the stakeholders that they were willing to collaborate with the Project Developer. The Project Developer also reiterated that the strategy of the proposed project activities would be rehabilitation as opposed to building new boreholes. In Kakuma, there is already an established Water Users Committee representing different villages, and it is advised by the stakeholders that collaboration must also be sought with this committee. Another concern raised by the stakeholders during this meeting, different from the one in Lorugum, was the fact that when there is drought, the water levels become too low, and the handpumps are not designed to go deeper; hence, they

can't obtain water during the drought when there is a need for constant water withdrawal. The Project Developer suggested that the solarisation of boreholes is being considered in the scope of the project activities to go deeper into the aquifer. The chlorination topic was also brought into light regarding the issue of excess chlorination causing odour problems and distaste, and any strategies for chlorination were inquired. Project Developer assured that chlorination would be done according to the standards, regular water quality tests and controls would be conducted, and the community would be prevented from using the water point for 1 day after the chlorination. All stakeholders indicated they would support, be with, and help the Project Developer throughout the process. There were complaints about the different organisations drilling boreholes in the same place. The Project Developer assured the stakeholders that they would conduct a thorough mapping, and if there is a borehole functioning 20m from another borehole, a new borehole won't be drilled.

During this meeting, the representatives of Kolobeyei Integrated Socio-Economic Development Plan in Turkana West raised some concerns, such as the connectivity of the community, the productivity of the borehole and the problem of water wastage.

Project Developer stated that it is difficult to reach all water resources in Turkana County, and a coordinated mapping with County Government Directors is required to see where the need is and where the gap is. Also, during this meeting, a salinity issue was raised, and the stakeholders stated that even if the borehole is functioning, the water coming is saline. The Project Developer assured the stakeholders that he would investigate this problem more deeply and try to address this problem by planting a desalination plant.

Representatives of the Empowering Young African Leadership Center and the Department of Refugee Services (DRS) attended the meeting. They mentioned that Kakuma village hosts the biggest refugee camp in Africa, with 300,000 refugees; the water is also a massive problem for the camp. They further went on to explain that there has been a high rate of daily influx of refugees to the reception centres in Kakuma and Kolobeyei. The essential services such as registration, water, cooked meals, medical services, hygiene promotion, accommodation, and child protection are overstretched due to the high rate of daily influx. They were excited about the prospects of this project and eager to see how the project activities would impact refugee camp residents in Kakuma and Kalobeyei.

Another topic that the stakeholders brought up was the fact that when the borehole stops functioning, no one in the community is capable of repairing it if the problem is

relatively small, so they thought that it would be better for some locals to be trained on the repair and maintenance of the boreholes so that when there is an immediate need, they can take action. The Project Developer reiterated that the strategy of the proposed project activities would be rehabilitation as opposed to building new boreholes. And The Project Developer ensured that local employment would be prioritised and that the locals with technical expertise and skills could be employed for minor repairs during the project activities. The Project Developer also guaranteed that anyone working for them would receive healthcare insurance and salary. The Project Developer also explained the following steps: conducting a mapping to find out which boreholes to be rehabilitated, a technical assessment of the boreholes and the identification of persons responsible for the management of the borehole; then baseline surveys will be conducted to understand the logistics and resources needed better as well as the perception of people using the water points and their WASH practices. Also, the Project Developer reiterated that if the borehole doesn't have water, it would be unnecessary to put resources into rehabilitating that borehole. The Project Developer highlighted that they need to ensure first that the borehole has enough water. For conducting the baseline survey, the Project Developer provided that they would need local support to complete the surveys, which will be another employment opportunity created by the project activities. A female participant mentioned that she has to walk 16 km from her village to the next water point because the borehole next to her village is not functioning. Another participant stated that even if there is water, the borehole won't be sustained if the people do not know how to use it—and praised the project activity in that it includes the community in the design and does not interfere with cultures, behaviours, and social settings. They encountered other donors who wanted to interfere with their religion and cultural settings. Project Developer assured the stakeholders that Training will be provided during project operation regarding the proper usage of boreholes, which will also be enhanced by WASH training. Additionally, stakeholders saw a great necessity regarding the ownership of the rehabilitated boreholes, and they could foresee a scenario where some private organisation or landowner would claim the right to the borehole and try to sell the water to the community. So, stakeholders requested from the Project Developer that the project explicitly state that the water is free and for community consumption. The Project Developer highlighted that they would rehabilitate boreholes in the public space and belong to no private entity. If someone comes up and claims ownership of the land, they will dismantle the pump and go somewhere else. The Project Developer also mentioned the consultation with County Chief Officers and the Deputy Governor about vandalism and ownership of the

boreholes; and stated that they are ready to support the community and us to protect the water point.

Meeting 3: Lodwar Town

Date: Thursday, 23rd June 2023

Opening Remarks

A short prayer session led by one of the village elders was held before the opening of the meeting. Project Developer`s local NGO partners led participants through the introduction process, each person introducing herself/himself and the area they had come from. Among the critical stakeholders, the Water Users Committee (Project Implementation Committee) consisting of three females and four males) was all present in the meeting. Also, the ELEM Development Organisation, a local NGO representative, attended the meeting, which is quite relevant for the project activities.

Presentation by Project Consultant

After mentioning the meeting agenda, the same procedures were applied as discussed above for the meetings held in Lorugum and Kakuma. A presentation about Climate Change, Gold Standard, Project Technology, Implementation Plan, Maintenance and repair Procedures was held, and the Safeguarding Principles and Sustainable Development concepts were discussed.

Discussions

Among the stakeholders, the ELEMI Development Organization was present. The organization's focus was on natural resource management, range land management, sustainable farming, and planting, as well as child protection and education, where they work with schools for adolescents, preventing them from the streets, reuniting them with their families, and supporting them with their education. The organization emphasized that boreholes that serve more people should be identified and rehabilitated first, ways to increase the pump yield should be sought, and irrigation schemes can be extended along the river and hinterland. They also mentioned the importance of water availability for minority communities such as pastoralists, where their livestock need grass and water to survive, and the livestock can be fed on the agricultural waste produced by increased agricultural activities. They further mentioned prolonged droughts, during which the fish stock in Turkana Lake reduced drastically, and the fisheries couldn't sell their product on the market due to the lower quality of fish; the reduction in fish stocks also resulted in conflicts with neighboring countries, such as Ethiopia there have been attacks since the fishermen have to go far in the lake to find fish. Also, the Chief of the Turkana Forestry Association attended the meeting and stated that the water supply could increase agricultural activities by improving irrigation, and water availability could help plant more trees, which can attract rain and improve water catchment, benefiting livestock. The stakeholders believed that with the help of the water supply, more trees would be planted, more rain would be attracted, and droughts would be reduced. With the availability of water, more different types of crops could be grown, providing the necessary variety of nutrition for children.

During the focus group discussion, the highest emphasis was on Gender Equality. Stakeholders believed that a safe water supply is directly related to women's health and hygiene due to their menstrual cycle, where their bodies are more prone to infections during menstrual periods. They also discussed that the project activities might bring

equal access to natural resources, reduce workload for women, and improve the division of workload among the members of families. Also, violence can be reduced with the project bringing water points closer to the women because sexual violence and harassment can happen during women's long travels to collect water. Additionally, stakeholders reiterated the importance of saving time by collecting water from a short distance and enabling women to do other income-generation or education-related activities.

Three groups mentioned the risk of increased conflicts due to rehabilitated water points. The ways to prevent conflict were discussed with the stakeholders. The stakeholders believed that a multi-sectorial approach is needed, and they stated that it is more than the involvement of the local chairman of the county government; community intervention is required to avoid sabotage and vandalism. Stakeholders believed that all project activities should be made public and all different stakeholder groups should be brought into dialogue for the governance of the Water Point project.

After focus group discussions on safeguarding principles and SDG contributions to the project, the local NGO representatives of the Project Developer continued with the two different mechanisms to be established for the sustainable functioning of the water points. One is the Project Implementation Committee (PIC), and the other is the Complaints Response Mechanism (CRM). The Water Users Committee was already established in Lodwar, and it was decided that this committee would serve as a PIC. For all corruption and gender discrimination issues, the CRM mechanism was established with 5 people, of which two women were to be contacted during all types of complaints, and all stakeholders were provided free calls, SMS numbers, and email addresses for any feedback or concern about the project activities.





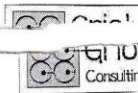
